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Learning – Growing – Adapting: The Lessons of Preschool Guide Us through Crisis

Educational experts agree that true learning is the result of struggle. Our deepest understanding comes after we wrestle our way through a challenge. Think of the child working hard to button a shirt. At first, little fingers struggle to hold the button and line it up with the correct hole. But eventually, the task becomes second nature.

The past year certainly presented more than its share of struggles for all of us. It has also provided opportunities to learn, grow, and adapt. The Preschool Advantage community of staff, board members and volunteers struggled to find ways to share ideas and solve problems without being in the same room, then adapted to a world of physical distance and Zoom meetings. Amidst lockdowns, we struggled to find families we could fund, then adapted by expanding our reach through the digital universe.

Our tireless event committees invited donors to join us for a virtual gala that exceeded all expectations, followed by a wonderful outdoor welcome event for new staff (finally back inperson!) and an outstanding and fruitful day of golf. The incredible flexibility of our volunteers was especially evident in our Child Placement Committee as they learned to review files through a secure online platform, comparing notes about applicants in virtual meetings and shared documents. Meanwhile, outreach volunteers replaced outdoor festivals and library visits with food distribution centers and online Board of Education meetings, spreading the word about Preschool Advantage wherever they could. Together, these dedicated individuals opened the doors of preschool to one child at a time.

By early summer four new faces appeared in our office, and I count my own among them, having joined Preschool Advantage one year earlier. Each of us dove into our work with enthusiasm, and when faced with new and unfamiliar tasks, responded with our office motto: "I don't know how to do that...YET!" Our shared passion for the Preschool Advantage mission made these challenges a joy.

As the 2020-2021 school year came to an end, 82 local children had finished a full year of learning at our partner schools, growing stronger and more capable each day and adapting to their newfound independence.

As I reflect on the past year, I am struck by how much our Preschool Community gave, both in time and in treasure, to secure that first and most essential educational opportunity for these children. I am also in awe of the families I had the opportunity to meet. So many had entered the pandemic earning just barely enough to make ends meet, then found themselves unemployed - or underemployed - in its wake. These families never stopped searching for the best opportunities for their children despite their difficult circumstances. Several even found time to volunteer in the office and on our Parent Advisory Committee.

I treasure the thank-you notes I received from the children who enjoyed a year of critically important learning. The courage and tenacity of the families I met this year will stay with me always. I am forever grateful and more committed than ever to assisting them as they secure a better future for their children. I have been inspired, too, by our resilient board of trustees that has not only kept us financially secure but has stayed focused on our mission, always looking forward to a future when we can start even more children on a journey of growth and learning.

Of course, all of this is only possible because of the powerful partnership Preschool Advantage has formed with the individuals, foundations and corporations who support our work so generously, even in the face of world-changing events. Over the past year "equity" and "access" have been repeated in the national dialogue as never before. Our country and our world are awakening to what you already know. Your support has always meant more than tuition to the children who benefit from your generosity. It is the first step to a better life.

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very year as summer winds down, we at Preschool Advantage conjure up visions of backpacks and lunch boxes while the children we have met prepare for their momentous first day of school. In August of 2020, Preschool Advantage students had a new item on their back-to-school shopping lists – facemasks.



28 partner preschool directors and staff worked tirelessly last summer to plan for reopening in the wake of the spring lockdown. Well into August, 2020 schools awaited guidance from the State regarding the new safety measures that would make it possible for young students to resume their preschool journey. Masks, physical distancing and plenty of outdoor time (even on chilly days) became the new normal, but we all let out a collective cheer that school was back in session.

Challenging Year s October approached it became clear that 2020's fall fundraiser would have to be a virtual affair. Given the unrelenting march of the pandemic this was no surprise, but the silver lining of our "Rainbow in the Clouds" online benefit was the incredible show of support among the Preschool Advantage community. Donors, staff and volunteers tuned in from home and aimed their generous spirit at the task of funding preschool tuition for the many local families who were struggling before Covid-19, and whose path to financial recovery was not going to be easy.

★ /e knew the need in our community had grown larger than ever, but with so many families riding out the pandemic at home, our traditional methods of outreach (houses of worship, doctors' offices and libraries) were off the table. Instead, our staff and volunteers relied on social media, personal referrals and food pantries to spread the word throughout the community that Preschool Advantage was here to support

local families determined to provide a preschool foundation for their children but unable to afford the cost.

Ith fewer opportunities to be together, the past year challenged our community to stay connected in new ways. Instead of the annual Preschool Directors' Luncheon, we gathered online with our partner preschools for an uplifting and educational webinar, and we deepened connections with our families by forming the first ever Parent Advisory Committee. Through it all, we welcomed new staff and volunteers to our team, even when the office itself was operating remotely.

Jolunteers are essential to so much of the work that goes on at Preschool Advantage, especially those volunteers on the Child Selection Committee who evaluate applications and help us make crucial decisions about which families we can fund.



Unwilling to let Covid-19 keep us from this vital collaboration, we moved our entire review process online and continued to work as seamlessly as possible through the magic of Zoom.

peaking of magic - in lieu of their typical Pasta for Preschool dinner, our fabulous Th grade partners at the Peck School in Morristown put on an amazing online show one chilly February night, combining fun lessons about pasta with a real-time cooking class. Participants at home transformed their pre-delivered ingredient kits into tasty gnocchi while raising a phenomenal \$10,000 for Preschool Advantage!

# Here's to the Heroes! A Tribute to our Partner Preschool Directors

"Hero" is a word we have been using a lot recently. But what makes a hero? Is a hero simply someone with superhuman strength who swoops down from the sky to save the world? No. A hero, as the Greek philosophers envisioned, is a perfectly ordinary person with one particular gift. A hero is a person who sees and understands the danger they are facing. The hero is even afraid. But the hero is unique because in the face of danger they choose to walk into the fire. In the face of danger, the hero creates new classroom routines for their young students who are too young to understand "social distance." The hero teaches those in their care to face danger with confidence by turning mask-wearing into a game, and creates outdoor classrooms where students can have a safe and nurturing place to learn and grow. And by confronting danger head-on the hero guides others through dangerous waters, making the world better for us all.

We are incredibly thankful for the courage and heroism of our partner preschool directors. Because of their efforts we were able to place 82 children in their classrooms during the tumultuous and confusing 2020-2021 school year. These are children whose parents cannot work from home. Many work on the front lines of the pandemic doing heroic work themselves, keeping grocery stores stocked and transporting the ill to hospitals. Others are home caring for younger siblings and know their 3 and 4 year-old children must prepare for their own journey with wise and experienced teachers. Their children need safe and inspiring environments where they can thrive and prepare for their future. Our Preschool partners provided these spaces and gave this care all year long. They opened the doors to Preschool and unlocked the possibilities beyond. What they accomplished was nothing short of heroic for the students in their care.

It is said that what doesn't bring you down makes you stronger. No doubt the challenges of this past year and a half have made us stronger, wiser and more thankful than ever to have the opportunity to play such an important role in the lives of our students.

Weekly ZOOM meetings were another way we tried to stay connected with our students. The children loved seeing their friends and teachers again, and would spend the first twenty minutes of the meeting just catching up and conversing. It was a great way to keep in touch, but it was difficult to transfer our normal learning activities to a 40 minute video call.

Friday, March 13, 2020 will always be known to us in the child care center community as the day the world changed. The public schools closed down and guidance about what child care centers should do was unclear at best. I reached out to local and state health officials for guidance. Recognizing that we serve many essential workers, we applied for and received an emergency license to keep our doors open. The most important step was to assess how each staff member was feeling. Were they uncomfortable, fearful, or needing to be with family members? Would we have enough staff willing and able to continue working? How many furloughs would be necessary?

Between March and June, 2020 when only the children of essential workers could be served by authorized child care providers, we were in survival mode: getting through one day at a time and working together to maintain normalcy for the children who depended on us for safety and security. Parents often said "thank you for staying open." We kept them informed about all we were doing to keep children


and staff safe, continually modifying as new information became available. Having the trust of the parents while many of them were under enormous stress themselves enabled us to remain positive.

Our main goal was to help each child stay busy with age-appropriate activities - to keep their minds occupied with normal concerns. Most children adapted readily to wearing masks, frequent hand-washing, and all the other safety measures we put in place. One child mentioned on a number of occasions that he was scared – that his parents were talking about COVID at home and he thought he would get sick. We talked with him, let him express his feelings, and then redirected his attention to his favorite games and activities. We shared many stories about fears, helping him and his classmates understand that we all have them and that we would take care of each other.

Our staff, too, needed frequent opportunities to express their concerns. As Director, my primary job was to listen whenever needed so our staff could feel reassured that we would come through this challenging time together. By taking care of each other we would be able to continue taking care of the children in a calm and optimistic manner.

When some of the restrictions were lifted, we remained vigilant. Even at the height of the pandemic our center managed very well through COVID and we wanted to continue doing everything we could to keep our whole community safe and happy.
